Learning target

Students will learn:

Everyone is born with a Manah (mind) which can be used in either a good or bad way or a combination of both

The ability to decide what is good and what is evil, is the function of understanding. Lesson for students:

A clear good mind that's been trained by you to listen, recognize, analyze, differentiate, and learn is your main tool. The decision to use it wisely and appropriately is yours and yours alone. You will have to face the consequences no matter what it is. You determine your destiny by your choices. So always seek new information from your parents, teachers, field experts, reliable sources, and past and present databases before you make an intelligent decision.

And when you make a wrong choice, learn from it and don't repeat it.

Basically, the fact of life is that it's a collection of good and bad choices; so prepare yourself through acquired knowledge to achieve the outcome you desire.



Activity for Students:

1: What responsibilities would you have when you start driving? What are the pros and cons of you driving? Is driving a choice?

- 2: what does it mean to be able to vote?Is voting something that you are excited about?Why is it important to live in a society that allows free election? (Do some research)What are the circumstances in which your vote counts besides government elections?
- 3: Why is there a legal age for drinking alcohol? Are you going to abide by it and why? What should you know about alcohol before its consumption? What are the limitations of alcohol use and why? (Do some research)
