Subject of the Lesson: Faranak and Fereidun

Background Knowledge for the Teacher:

Abtin, a descendant of King Jamshid and his wife, Faranak had a baby boy by the name of Fereidun whose face shone like the sun.

Zahhak's men searched the world for a boy named Fereidun. They caught the child's father, Abtin, and killed him. But brave Faranak snatched up her little son and fled. "Where can I hide him?" she wondered. "Who can I find to look after him?"

Far away in the meadow, there lived a cow, named Barmayeh, of wonderful strength and beauty, whose hide was the color of peacock feathers and whose milk was fit for a hero to drink. Faranak hurried to find the cow as fast as she could. When she arrived, she begged the herdsman that took care of Barmayeh to hide her son and to let him drink the cow's milk, as if he was its own child. The man agreed. Faranak went to the village to work and provide for Fereidun.

Three years passed. Zahhak, who was filled with fear, was haunted by the thought of the child who would grow up to conquer him. All he could think of was the hidden child.

At last, Zahhak and his men heard about the herdsman and Barmayeh and knew that is where Feridun must be. He sent his soldiers to capture the little boy, however, when they arrived, Fereidun was gone, only the herdsman and Barmayeh were left. Zahhak killed the herdsman and Barmayeh.

Faranak had heard of Zahhak's intention, and she raced to save her son. She reached him first and left with him to the sanctuary of a holy man, high up in the Alborz mountains. Lesson for students:

After reading the rest of the story to the students, the students can work on the activity listed below.

Activity for Students:

After reading the story, the students can complete a sentence sequence activity. In this activity, each student gets a sentence or groups of sentences from the story. The students will work together to try and put their sentences in the correct order of the story.
